## Updated Phase-Out Schedule for Agricultural Burning and Available Funding Support

To address state mandates and continue to improve air quality, the San Joaquin Valley is in the final stage of a multi-year tiered phase-out of agricultural open burning under an established schedule adopted by the Valley Air District and California Air Resources Board. The phase out schedules for vineyard removals, orchard removals, and surface harvested prunings are all structured to phase out burning for larger agricultural operations first, then gradually phase out burning for smaller operations. As of January 1, 2024, the final stage of the phase-out schedule for vineyard removals, small orchard removals, and surface harvested prunings are now in effect, including the prohibition of raisin tray burning (please refer to attached infographic for details). While the vast majority of burning will be phased out by January 1, 2025, there are a few limited exceptions where burning will be allowed including: apple, pear, and quince removals; diseased materials, rice levees/banks, and limited maintenance purposes.

Due to unprecedented wildfires and stagnant winters with little precipitation, there may be significantly fewer opportunities to conduct burning through the District's Smoke Management Permitting System. **The District recommends all growers review the phase-out dates and consider alternatives to open burning as the prohibitions take effect.** Please note that regardless of when materials have been removed and piled, authorization to burn cannot be granted after the listed phase-out dates.

## Grant Funding Available For Alternatives to Burning

The District has continually worked with agricultural stakeholders to identify alternatives for the disposal of agricultural waste and to make those alternatives more accessible to Valley growers through grant funding opportunities. In November 2018, the District's Governing Board approved the Ag Burn Alternatives Grant Program (<u>https://ww2.valleyair.org/grants/ag-burn-alternatives-grant-program</u>), which offers incentive funding for alternative disposal practices, including chipping and soil incorporation. As we enter the final year of the phase-out, the District's Governing Board took action in January 2024 to ensure continued funding and broad program access to Valley growers. Please note that the program provides specific funding per acre for various alternatives and crop types (including enhancements for smaller growing operations), and funding is capped at 250 acres of removals per entity per calendar year.

## **District Staff Available to Provide Assistance**
